The biblical principle of the Titus 2 mandate transcends our life season and circumstance. As the Sovereign Lord has given us a new year, CEP's prayer is that your ministries, both personal and corporate, will be intentionally focused on biblical discipleship.

The 2006 International Women in the Church Conference theme verses, Psalm 71:17-18 challenges us to readiness and obedience. *"Since my youth, O God, you have taught me, and to this day I declare your marvelous deeds. Even when I am old and gray, do not forsake me, O God, until I proclaim your might to another generation, your power to all those who come."*

THE PRIVILEGE OF CARING

In the first quarter of 2007, we gave our readers a look into the life of a PCA chaplain's family, Jay and Donna Outen and their children. We heard them tell of the challenges and opportunities they both faced in the desert of Iraq and stateside. We would like to begin this new year by sharing the good news that the Lord safely returned Jay and his men home in October after a 15-month deployment. As this family is reunited, they would ask us to join them in praise and glory to the Lord who enabled them to persevere; they lived day by day in His sufficient grace. Pray with them for safety, peace, and resolution of this war and that the Lord will continue to use PCA chaplains and families to draw others to Christ.



While Jay was deployed overseas, Donna and their children lived at Ft. Bragg, NC. Their church home-away-from-home was Cross Creek PCA, in Fayetteville, NC. It is a church body that takes seriously the biblical responsibility and privilege to care and provide for the families of men and women who guard our nation's freedoms.

On April 21, 2007, the women of Cross Creek Presbyterian Church honored their chaplains' wives with a luncheon, asking each one to take part by giving a brief bio of herself in her role as a chaplain's wife. Due to its proximity to Fort Bragg and Pope Air Force base, several chaplain families attend the church. The chaplains' wives who were able to attend that day were Catherine Kirk, wife of Monty Kirk (Air Force); Marise Fairbrother, wife of Mark Fairbrother (Army); Donna Outen, wife of Jay Outen (Army); and Elisabeth Lanious, wife of Chet Lanious (Army).

Each of these women spoke of her experience as a chaplain's wife, some serving just a few years and others for many. They shared the privilege of serving the Lord alongside their husbands in many parts of the world and the challenge of often rearing their children in the

absence of their husbands during deployments. They unanimously underscored God's great grace and faithfulness in their lives.

The event, well received by the women in the church, will probably be repeated. All were very encouraged after getting to know these special women in a deeper way. Women in the church continue to mention the event, and they have been more conscious of the honored women, praying for their needs. The chaplains' wives have all expressed gratefulness for having been recognized in this way.

Cross Creek PC has a deep appreciation for its military members and works hard to care for their families, especially during deployments. In fact, an office has been added to their WIC Council in order to better minister to them. This woman keeps track of the needs of the families of the deployed (a list which constantly changes) and plans monthly get-togethers/lunches for support and encouragement.

- The 36th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in America will convene June 10-13, 2008, in Dallas, Texas, hosted by the Presbytery of North Texas.
- Chapter 14 of the *Book of Church Order* says:
“The General Assembly is the highest court of this Church, and represents in one body all the churches thereof. It bears the title of The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in America, and constitutes the bond of union, peace, and correspondence among all its congregations and courts.”
- Commissioners are chosen by each presbytery and are made up of ruling and teaching elders. The host committee will mail the commissioner’s packets on February 1, 2008 to ruling and teaching elders.
- The packet contains the schedule and information on activities and programs for children and women. Early registration is a good thing! Be sure to look through the handbook for these opportunities.
- Why should you, as a ruling or teaching elder’s wife, want to attend? To share a time of rest, fellowship with dear friends, time away with your biological and spiritual family, and opportunities for spiritual equipping and worship.
- Staying true to CEP/WIC purposes of nurturing and encouraging wives of ruling and teaching elders in marriage and ministry, we have planned a week of refreshment, teaching, fellowship, and focused prayer for each other, our husbands and churches, and our denomination.

MAKING VISIBLE GOD'S INVISIBLE KINGDOM

Dear Women in the Church,

Strategically, 2008 could be the most significant year in my tenure as Coordinator of CEP. I think back over the years at the great conferences God has allowed us to host. Each one has been designed with the prayers and hope that God would use the PCA as a denomination to make a significant difference for God's kingdom and church. We have seen and heard some marvelous stories and testimonies growing out of those conferences.

However, this year God has led us to host a conference that takes all the key elements of those previous conferences and put them together in a holistic way that focuses on the kingdom of God and a world and life view perspective. After all, that is what Christianity is all about; and yet, there is an obvious failure to understand what the kingdom involves. Some of the results are really detrimental to the Christian faith. Beliefs such as the idea that Christianity is simply one religion among many from which we choose which best suits us; or dualism, which says there is a part of my life that belongs to God and another part that is mine to do with what I choose; or it doesn't matter how I live as long as I am a morally upright person because that will be enough to get me into heaven. And so it goes.

Our theme of ministry at CEP, whether it is in parts such as the Women in the Church, children and youth, men's ministry, seminar training, or curriculum development, is the kingdom of God. At a time when the church is hovering over the brink of irrelevance and its influence being more and more marginalized, neutralized, and compromised, we believe the PCA has the opportunity to make a real difference in preaching, teaching, and living out kingdom intention. We are planning a conference on kingdom discipleship, **"Making Visible God's Invisible Kingdom" in Atlanta November 13-15, 2008 at the Atlanta Omni Hotel**. It is designed for those of you involved in various ministries: women in the church, men's ministries, children and youth leaders, officers, pastors and wives. The conference will feature such speakers as Chuck Colson, Christian Smith, and myself as plenary speakers. Seminars will be conducted for all the above ministries to encourage a kingdom perspective in the context of discipleship. It is being planned with the prayer that our PCA churches will set as their priority making kingdom disciples. As we develop this conference and theme, there is also a kingdom of darkness that is very real that does not want Christians to have this kingdom of God framework.

Not only do we want to challenge, invite, and encourage you to attend, but we want you to join us in praying that God would be pleased to bring together those men and women who are willing to step up and be used of God to live out kingdom obedience and disciple the rising generations to do the same. Your prayers have meant so much to us in the past, and at this crucial moment we dare not move forward without knowing that you will join us in prayer for all the planning of the conference, the conference itself, as well as the speakers and leaders for the two and a half day event. We believed God raised up the PCA in 1973; and we know it was not for us, but for Him to accomplish His purpose of extending His kingdom throughout all the earth. We believe God has given us a key role in fulfilling His vision. Join with us in your prayers and attendance. This event will be held at the end of a long presidential campaign. Regardless of its outcome, we need to know that our hope is in God, Who through His Son, King Jesus, rules and reigns over all things and will finish His purpose in and through us.—*"Not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, says the Lord of hosts."* Zech 4:6

BUILDING? RE-BUILDING!

Cultivating a “fresh-start” mindset for women’s ministry

The Women in the Church office here at CEP recently had the pleasure of meeting the pastor, the new Director of Women Ministries, and the Bible Study Coordinator of Westminster Presbyterian Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. It was a time of new beginnings for their women’s ministries. The pastor, Michael Rogers, contacted CEP to ask if the new Director of Women, Joan Stratton, could attend the 2007 Fall Retreat for PCA Directors of Women. We said, “Yes!” A few short months later, it encourages us to highlight their intentional and well crafted discipleship ministry that exhibits wise leadership from the pastor and session who are helping to set biblical goals for the women of their church. Joan shares the process.



wise structuring, and patient communication of purpose. In short, Westminster’s women’s ministry had a golden opportunity!

The overall challenge was this - How can we establish and maintain a biblically and theologically sound women’s ministry which follows a relational mode?

Three concepts became guidelines:

- * Establish and maintain core goals.
- * Develop essential support for the ministry.
- * Nurture leadership.

RECONSTRUCTION REVITALIZATION RESTORATION

Could your women’s ministry use any one of these?

What if you could “recreate” your women’s ministry, regardless of how long it has been established?

“What if” can become the mindset that keeps women’s ministries carefully headed in essential directions. It can bring new meaning to the question: “How can we *keep* doing this better?”

A blank slate

In August 2007, Westminster Presbyterian, Lancaster, PA, a 39-year-old church of 1000 members, had just hired its first Director of Women’s Ministry. I found myself with a few definite, core goals in mind, a very general job description in hand, and only a few women’s activities in place. There was no predecessor to imitate or interview, and I was not sure how many people shared my vision of women’s ministry. The “blank slate” was intimidating, but soon I saw it as an excellent setting for development. Instead of dropping me into a sea of things that needed correcting and coordinating, the Lord had laid out a challenge of near-emptiness which called for prayerful planning,



Establishing core goals

Whether you have the luxury of building a new ministry from the ground

up or need to check the infrastructure of a developed work, it is essential to revisit core goals regularly. They should be in writing. They should be your ready check-list. They should be understood and shared by your leadership.

Westminster’s pastoral staff and I, as the Director of Women’s Ministry, have agreed on three core goals:

Ministry will be needs-driven, emphasizing mentoring, small groups, and need-specific support groups.

Scripture will remain central and be the basis for building fellowship. Large events will celebrate already-established fellowship.

Women’s ministry will be intergenerational, interfacing with existing age-specific and ministry-specific church activities.

Senior Pastor Dr. Michael Rogers commented that “meaningful relationships are going to matter in the future more than programs that aim merely to entertain or inspire. Our women’s ministry must meet women at the point of their vulnerabilities and move along a biblical path towards wholeness.”

Since Scripture is our basis for establishing needed relationships, it is a huge blessing that weekly women's Bible studies and one women's Sunday School class are already in place at Westminster and functioning well. The Bible studies, which are offered weekly, are coordinated by volunteer Chris Groff who states her overall goal as "teaching 100 percent truth, allowing the women to feel safe and unconditional love, and meeting them where they are."



An intergenerational pattern will be sought in making plans for specific support groups, large events, and an on-going examination of ways for women to become more involved in ministry within the church as well as outreach.

Maintaining needed support

Prayer support is crucial. This is being established between individual leaders and is an on-going request within the women's groups. A small accountability and prayer team specifically supports me and upholds the ministry.



The pastoral staff and Session agree that their endorsement and support clarifies and dignifies the ministry and affirms the women of the church. To demonstrate this, the senior pastor and women's leadership are planning a spring event that will allow them to address all the women of the church and have a question/answer time.

Women's leadership can shore up and enhance these areas in need of support by being involved in prayer efforts and by keeping the Session and pastoral leadership up-to-date through such things as a written, monthly report.

Nurturing women's leadership

Communication within women's leadership is vital. Get-together times should include prayer, vision-casting, review of core goals as related to problems and possibilities, and encouragement around the Word. At Westminster, Bible study leaders and I have begun to meet and will do so several times annually.



A mind-set that works toward personal growth and training is crucial. I want to find ways to help women's leaders develop their abilities to handle Scripture, to teach/facilitate small groups, and to grow in their personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Such instruction will overflow into their ministry.



Looking toward the future

Dr. Rogers summarized our ministry by saying, "We seek a women's ministry that is not founded on performance, efficiency, personal image, or success, but on real relationships with Christ and one another."

Perhaps the following guidelines seem overly simplistic for established women's ministries. On the other hand, the basic equations are usually very simple and can help refocus and invigorate even what seems to be set in granite!

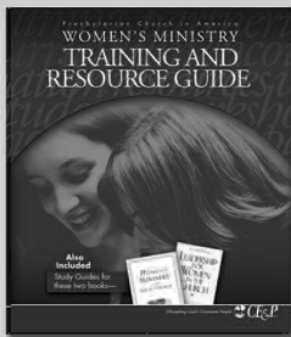
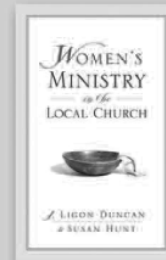
- Maintain a vital basis of prayer and accountability.
- Keep regular contact with supporting entities.
- Examine plans and progress in the light of core goals.
- Take advantage of denominational resources (curricula, conferences).
- Grow in personal fellowship with Christ.
- Model ministry!

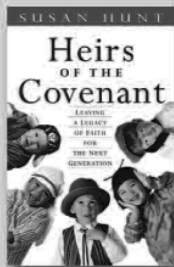

One of the highlights of the 2007 Directors of Women's Ministries retreat was to see the exchange of ideas and yearly themes for the various represented women's ministries. The purposes set the themes of the ministries for the year and are followed through with retreats, fellowships, Bible study options, and opportunities for service. As a part of the mission's conference at **Grace Presbyterian in Peoria, Illinois**, the women's ministries hosted a morning tea for the women missionaries supported by the church. It was a special time set aside to meet these women and learn about life on the mission field, "whether it's a college campus or foreign country."

"Broken Women Reflecting God's Glory" is the women's ministry theme at **Christ Community Church in Franklin, Tennessee**. Along with Bible studies and special events, this women's ministry offers unique outreach to women in several ways. **Women Praying with Women** is a prayer ministry to women during the church services. **Baby Greeters** serve new mothers by preparing and delivering meals to their homes. **Women who participate in** Honoring the Elderly minister to residents of a local nursing home; **Women's Prison Ministry** provides an opportunity to share the scriptures and pray, give testimonies, and worship through music with women

inmates of a nearby penitentiary. Finally, **Graceworks** offers to meet emergency needs of the poor of the community through a seniors program, thrift store, and pantry.

A special issue of the Women's Newsletter at **Briarwood Presbyterian in Birmingham, Alabama** was entitled "Celebrating 50 Years of Marriage." Fifteen Briarwood couples shared their insights into how God has used marriage of 50+ years to draw them, as a couple, closer to Himself by answering such questions as, "What holds a marriage together during the challenging times?" and "How has God blessed your marriage in the midst of those times?" Each couple's picture (some recent, some wedding photos) appears along with their words of wisdom. The couples are celebrated for the godly examples they provide in their homes, community, and church; for sharing the importance of commitment; for demonstrating the magnitude of having a Christ-centered marriage; and finally "for showing us how true love is refined by fire."

The women of **Park Cities Presbyterian in Dallas, Texas**, had several opportunities to get acquainted on a deeper level with get-togethers called **The Bridge: Connecting Women of All Ages**. A casual dinner in a member's home was followed by personal testimonies from various women in the church. The goal was for the women to form deeper relationships as they met in smaller groups and heard about others' lives and walks with the Lord. The events were open to all women in the church from ages 23 and up, encouraging women of different ages and stages to meet and connect.

The third Thursday of each month is set aside for "Service Circles" at **Independent Presbyterian in Memphis, Tennessee**. New Beginnings, Palmer Home for Children, Life Choices, a sister church, and several other church-supported ministries provide opportunities to serve the community. A nursery is provided so everyone can participate.

As part of the **Widow's Ministry at Perimeter Church in Duluth, Georgia**, a special luncheon is held every other month for those who have been widowed. The purpose is to "provide appropriate service and care to new widows and to those who have been widowed for any length of time." This also gives opportunity for these women to develop relationships, both for fellowship and for practical ministry.

In an effort to get to know their church family better, the women of **Christ Presbyterian in Nashville, Tennessee**, orchestrated **January Soup Kitchens**. Small groups gathered in several homes during that month for lunches and dinners.
